## Report: Volleyball bridges cultural divide in TN

Social and political integration through sport is not an unusual concept. Indo-Pak cricket ties are certainly an example and back home in Tamil Nadu volleyball is also proving to be a case study of how sport can bridge the divide caused by caste and culture.

Many senior citizens as part of a Volleyball team are vying for honours. For the first time women in these villages have come to the play fields. They say participating in these games has helped them discover their potential.

In the finals of an inter village tournament a fifty-seven-year old lady was the star attraction.

"I feel so young. This has revived the interest I had in games. Now I have the same enthusiasm that I had when I was a little girl," said the woman.

### Social change

Most of these villagers are labourers and games were not a part of their life in the past. Often they were clashing with each other on communal lines.

Now a voluntary organization has helped them form volley ball teams in over a hundred villages and this has brought together around seven thousand people.

"We are just using sport as a way of integrating people, beyond caste and religions. The necessary enthusiasm is needed for any social change to happen. The game is just one of the means for that to happen," said Sadhguru Jaggi, Founder, ISHA foundation.

### Professional training

For the younger players the prospect of getting a professional coach could find them a place in the district team.

"We use lights and practise till late. Earlier we used to just sit around and waste our time after work," said an enthusiastic player.

For more than fifty thousand people this was a memorable event. Having experienced the joy and unifying power of games, volleyball is going to be an integral part of their life.
